allowing the manager to devote more time to people with complex issues. Hope Corner is a registered Warm Space (in winter) and Cool Space (in summer), providing relief to those who find it difficult to cope with the different challenges that our climate is throwing at us.

Our work for digital inclusion has been active – in summer we completed a survey of more than 500 houses on Dollis Valley and were able to prove many examples of digital exclusion among residents. The centre is able to offer free and fast Wifi (provided free of charge by Community Fibre). In October, we hosted Boost employment and social outreach surgeries while Chipping Barnet Library was refurbished.

The Dollis Valley Flexible Fund, which we administer, awarded grants to Barnet Community Projects, Mama Haven, Underhill Children's Centre, Barnet Carers and Hope Corner.

In terms of funding, we received a three-year grant for a Seniors Outreach Worker from City Bridge Trust and are currently recruiting for this full-time position. Other funders: Hadley Trust, Jesus Hospital, Space2Grow 29, Hyde Foundation, Good Things Foundation, Barnet Community Fund, Cooperative, DVFF and Churches Together.

Hope Corner and Barnet Churches Action (BCA)

More than ever, we give God the glory for all that has been achieved in challenging times at Hope Corner. We thank Him for His guidance, support and protection which has enabled the charity to get stronger and reach more people than ever before.

Hope Corner is well established as the community hub in Underhill Ward and has excellent connections with local authority and voluntary organisations. Janet (our manager) has steered the ship through choppy waters, both professionally and personally, coping with changes in personnel at our regeneration partners and increasing our lettings, including a new long-term let with Longrove Surgery to provide a special NHS clinic for vulnerable people.

The kitchen and café team have brought the café back to pre-Covid levels and make our Seniors Lunch a weekly event that all look forward to, as well as those who receive our twice weekly lunch deliveries. We run a free weekly children's Art Club and twice-weekly free Remedial Maths classes, both of which are oversubscribed. We are thankful for our volunteers – but we are always seeking more, including trustees.

Our Community Support Project has seen significantly higher numbers of people seeking assistance and support, some in real crisis. To cope with the upsurge, we introduced 1-to-1 appointments in September,

Deanery Synod

The Deanery Synod is one way the Church of England gives people at different roles within their own Church, a chance to discuss key issues and also to help to organise the church's ministry and mission. It sits between the parishes with their Parochial Church Councils (PCCs) and the full diocese, with its Diocesan Synod.

It meets approximately four times a year, sometimes with guest speakers, meetings are held at various churches throughout the Deanery.

One area of focus this year has been the real importance of the regeneration (and therefore emergence) of Colindale, a mere 6 miles away from us here in High Barnet and within our borough. It looked at the three churches that are within the new area and focused on both

The Centre can still call on a group of active volunteers from within and beyond the CCB congregation albeit numbers were slightly lower than the c.20 seen in previous years. We remain extremely grateful to all volunteers for their support and commitment and would welcome any further applications from new or aspiring volunteers who would like to get involved.

Alongside completion of the ground-floor extension, 2023 was also an important year in terms of revisiting and reviewing the missional objectives of the Centre in the context of Christ Church Barnet (CCB). Specifically, and further to agreement of the PCC in May, a joint ODC/PCC Working Group was established to prayerfully review how best to use the Centre to help deliver the vision and mission of the church.

The Working Group met on six occasions and the approach adopted combined: Two weeks of prayer focus in June for the ODC; A detailed questionnaire about the Centre for church

members and customers that were completed in September; The completion of several meetings with key stakeholder groups, and; Visits by Working Group members to several local church-affiliated community centres in the Barnet area to understand and learn from similar organisations.

A paper and draft proposals were presented to the PCC in January 2024 which were unanimously approved. One of the key proposals is to formally lay down the first-floor development for at least 2024/2025. Whilst the development plans are not being cancelled, it has become evident through the review that now is just not the right time.

Rather, the focus for the next two years will be on using what we have already been blessed with to support the local community, and paying off the loan as soon as possible and before any further development of the building. In this respect the trustees took a decision in January 2024 to reduce the outstanding loan balance through a capital repayment from available funds and increase monthly repayments to shorten the residual term. The trustees and declare, a spiritual battle but we know where the victory has been won. We look to Him alone!

2024 will be a year of change and transition. Change can be unsettling to some but it's an opportunity to trust in the One who is the Lord of the church. We pray with passion and expectation for more to encounter the love of Jesus, to discover the joy of walking with the prince of peace and be filled afresh with His incredible Holy Spirit.

A Year at Christ Church Primary School

Through God's Love, we learn, aspire, and achieve; we flourish.

It has once again been a very busy year at school, a time to consolidate and build upon the developments in education, continuing to move forward to ensure that our children receive the best education that we can offer, through our Christian values.

We were fortunate to have had only two staff changes this September, as we said good bye to Miss Byrne, who moved on to pursue travelling plans and Mrs Brennan who had been a meal time supervisor for many years and retired to enjoy time with her family.

We had our long- awaited SIAMS inspection and were pleased to attain a Good judgement and Excellent in Collective worship. The inspector was particularly impressed with the children's direct involvement in organising and leading the class worships each week. He made some very positive comments and said that Christ Church School was "a community filled full of love, gently, with consistent Christian rootedness, bringing about flourishing." He concluded that we demonstrate a "quiet, steadfast purpose of high- quality Church of England education which is shared by all."

We also celebrated the King's Coronation this year. There was a school homework set in which the children wrote about the changes they would make if they ruled the country, and the constitution they would put forward. There were many excellent ideas, linked to the school values and one of the children was chosen to be "Monarch of the Day" and her constitution was followed. This was loved by all, especially the school picnic and ice lollies. The children enjoyed archery and maypole dancing and the celebration was ended with the National Anthem and flag waving.

The school community have continued to support many charities and have regularly collected foodstuffs for the Barnet Food Hub.

There have been some changes in the redecoration and maintenance of the building with no major projects needed. The bungalow has been redecorated with new carpet and painted walls and the Breakfast Club and After School Club children are enjoying the transformation. The Key Stage 1 children had a new climbing frame installed in their playground, replacing the one that had lasted for many years. The Nursery and Reception children also had a new piece of climbing equipment installed in their garden too.

In terms of academic achievement, the school performed extremely well in all the end of Key stage assessments and the Y1 phonics test. Every member of staff has worked enthusiastically through the year, from the office staff, to our caretaker, school meal supervisors, our teaching assistants and our teachers. They all give generously of their time and have the highest expectations and care for the children. It is a strong team demonstrating and putting into practice the values we share.

Building on the previous year, 2023 was a busy and productive time for the Open Door Centre (ODC) with good progress made on many fronts.

Operationally, the activity of the drop in café continued to strengthen and ended the year back at, if not finally exceeding, the levels seen pre-pandemic which is encouraging.

Notwithstanding the cost-of-living crisis continued to escalate throughout 2023 and impact the Centre, and indeed the wider economy and society, through higher food prices and utility costs, it continued to respond well under the leadership and guidance of the Management Sub-Committee and Board of Trustees. The ongoing financial support of local grant-making trusts and individual supporters remained important for the organisation and is very much appreciated.

Alongside the café operation, room letting activity remained solid throughout 2023 and the Centre would like to thank all customers for their continued support and usage of the facility.

From a strategic perspective, excellent progress was made in mobilising the plans for the ground-floor extension to the building. Specifically, and after a thorough review process, the trustees were delighted to appoint a local contractor to build a ground-floor extension to the kitchen as part of a phased approach adopted to the development of the building. The extension was largely completed by year-end and the new opportunities this will afford for community outreach are a particular highlight and area of focus.

Overall, the building project went well, and the trustees are pleased with the result which is already making a positive difference. That said, and due to some additional unplanned work to rebuild the chimney that was required, the project took a few weeks longer than originally envisaged. This primarily impacted income generated from the café which operated a reduced menu and shorter opening hours whilst the building work was underway. The team and customers alike were delighted to welcome back 'business as usual' from early November with the Centre very busy and thriving. We have seen several of our long-standing members pass into God's care this last year. We have also been delighted to welcome some new faces.

In the last year our charity support has focussed on The Evangelical Alliance Relief (TEAR) Fund and Christians Against Poverty (CAP), with generous contributions from our members. We are currently supporting CARE - Christian Action, Research & Education.

Once a month we enjoy a delicious lunch, lovingly prepared by Kate Saint and her team.

We have been blessed to hear from a variety of speakers and musical performers.

Several members of the church family have spoken at our meetings; including Carol Betts at our Christmas celebration. Quizzes are always popular, and we have a termly Bring & Buy sale to enhance funds.

Julie Lewis led a wonderful "Mini Oasis" day in August; with craft, entertainment and food in abundance!

A fantastic support team (transport, setting-up, refreshments and technical) enable the smooth running of our meetings. Without them, the leadership team could not function. A particular "Thank you" to those of you who responded to our cry out for drivers recently, such a need for many of our members.

We pray that God's love would freely be shared in Thursday Fellowship and that He will continue to bless us and draw near to all of our members.

Fabric Report 2023

The Churchwardens can report on the fabric, goods and ornaments as follows:

Audio-Visual System

For the second year this section is now covered in a separate 'Technical Report'.

Computing and Data

There have been no new hardware or software purchases this year. Anthony Mak-Fan has continued his sterling work in maintaining the computer hardware and network, both in the offices and in the church. The performance of all technology is continually monitored.

Quinquennial Inspection

The outstanding work continues to be reviewed.

Health and Safety Matters

We hold current certificates for gas, electrical installation, fire and lightning conductor, which are all inspected at the recommended intervals. We consider Health and Safety to be of great importance and we are grateful to everyone for their compliance with our systems. The intruder alarm continues to be an asset to our security.

Two fire drills with the children's groups were carried out in 2023, both exercises went well.

Heating System

The heating systems have again been trouble-free during the year, needing no attention apart from regular servicing.

Repairs and Maintenance

More parapet repairs were carried out, as well as painting the staircase to the balcony.

The main item of redecoration this year was the church tower. This turned out to be much more work than anticipated and was completed using a mixture of volunteer and paid labour. We were greatly blessed by the timber for the repair work being supplied free of charge by the timber merchant, saving us almost \$1,000!

Whilst carrying out this work two swift nesting boxes were fitted to the North and West faces of the tower using money gifted to CCB by a third party. These are fitted with cameras, as well as speakers to attract nesting birds.

The porch was also refurbished and repainted as part of this work. The preschool office was redecorated and the lighting updated. New fencing and driveway were also supplied to 8 Wentworth Road. Many thanks to all those who helped with this work.

The Terrier

The contents of the terrier (the inventory of moveable and fixed articles in the church's possession) have been checked and all items are present.

Personnel

A new Premises Manager, Soorena Saharnaz was employed from March until November, we are incredibly thankful for his service to Christ Church during this time. A replacement will be appointed early in 2024.

We initiated live broadcasts of morning services at the start of the first lockdown in 2020, this has proved a popular way of reaching those who are housebound and indeed regular viewers from far and wide, we have therefore continued to broadcast both the 9am and 10:45am Sunday services live where the combined viewing figures average at around 90 weekly.

Apart from the early morning prayer meetings (Tuesday – Friday) there are now no regularly scheduled Zoom meetings, these have all been replaced with normal in person meetings. We continued to write, rewrite and implement various risk assessments in line with various governmental & diocesan. Action in Barnet and Barnet Homes which supports vulnerable people needing accommodation and Barnet Social Services. I have so many people to thank....

The wonderful team, affectionately called 'The Renew Crew', who sourced items required and managed to get everything we needed from their friends and neighbours. These amazing helpers also delivered gift packages to clients, which wasn't always an easy task!

Everyone who donated items, lovely ladies who knitted blankets, ladies who made unclean things very clean!, financial supporters, Thursday Fellowship for making Renew their Charity for a term, The Wesley Hall Christmas collections and The Monken Holt for generous donations of toiletries.

To Sharon Butler who saved me from managing the finances! Also, to Ges as we became part of the Compassionate Ministries at CCB. To Wendy Crawford who made crosses in a pouch with a verse enclosed to give to clients, Jo and Pat who patiently and kindly stored so many items in the office. To Graham Paddon who PAT tested all of our electrical items, ensuring safety. To Andy and team for their continued support, encouragement and advice.

To Jean Corney who right at the very beginning let me store lots of items in the Open Door as gifts were coming in quickly and I didn't have any place to keep them.

To the people who prayed, it was good to be able to tell the Clients that CCB were praying for them. Seeds were sown, I am sure of that and for me, showing people Jesus' love was what it was all about.

Night Shelter

Christ Church did not run a shelter in 2023 as we were the first to volunteer to run a shelter in November 2022, as soon as the relevant COVID restrictions had been lifted – something our guests were very grateful for. We will be back in 2024 at our more usual time, demonstrating the love of Jesus by providing food and safe shelter for some of the most vulnerable in society.

Renew

It is with sadness that I write the last report of Renew to you all. As you may know, in May 2023 I had to have a head surgery and the recovery was quite long. Part of the recovery meant that I couldn't drive for six months and couldn't lift heavy objects. Obviously, these are key elements to getting household items to our Renew clients, and so with a heavy heart and much prayer, I decided to end this very lovely and worthwhile project.

Renew began in June 2020 after supporting a young man I met on the Winter Night Shelter who moved into his first accommodation, which was unfurnished. The process of Renew was to receive preloved household goods, store until needed and then give out to clients referred by our Charity partners. Once people began to hear about it, I was amazed at the offers of help and delighted with the amount of household gifts donated. We linked up with Charities such as the Barnet Care Leaving Team, Solace Women's Aid, Homeless As with every year, we want to express our appreciation for all the work done by the many volunteers who help to keep Christ Church running as smoothly as it does. The foodbank and the compassion fund, to name but two, once again helped CCB project the message of the Gospel in the most practical and effective of ways, these services have been delivered entirely by a volunteer network from within the CCB family.

Safeguarding

We have undertaken a big training drive for our volunteers this year. Technical

The two regular Sunday services have continued throughout 2023, involving sound, visuals and streaming. As always, the hunt for regular volunteers continues although we are blessed with the services of

Barnet Cap Debt Centre

It has been a busy 12 months from which we have much to thank God for. In 2023 we saw 15 people go debt free for whom £194,616.63 of debt was cleared. £43,392.69 of this was repaid and the remaining £151,223.94 was cleared through insolvency. During this time we have also supported a number of other households and journeyed alongside them as they have taken steps to manage their finances.

In addition to meeting regular clients, Beth has been attending the Chipping Barnet Foodbank once a month. This has provided a great opportunity to build awareness and connections and also receive referrals. This relationship with the Foodbank also provided an opportunity for us to present to their volunteers as well as a number of referral agencies across the borough, which was well received. Karen has attended the local Barnet Job Centre to build on relationships previously established and conversations with other referral agencies have begun.

As always, it was a joy to arrange for clients to receive Christmas Hampers, generously provided by Jesus House, and we also had the pleasure of personally delivering gifts to all our clients and each member of their household. We were able to specifically choose gifts for each person and were also grateful for those who donated items that were well received.

Six of us have recently trained as money coaches to facilitate CAP's new money coaching sessions. We are planning to hold our first course with some of our previous clients this coming April. The course will provide tools in day to day money management and budgeting.

We have been blessed to have more volunteers join us at the Debt Centre; Jonathan Brown from Oakleigh Community Church came on board as a befriender and Anthea Miles joined us to assist our clients with filling out various forms and benefit applications.

We continue to have the opportunity of praying in person with each client every time we meet with them and we are grateful for others that join with us in holding them before God for specific situations. We are thrilled that we have had specific answers to prayer over this year, especially around provision of housing and other things which may seem smaller but remind us and our clients that God cares and wants to provide. We have also seen clients engage with church by always made clear to clients that our provision is for a limited period and that we are here to be a bridge to help them through a crisis point.

Incredibly over these years the team has largely been made up of the following folk: Kate Saint, Abbie Roberts, Gilly Bean, Richard Lawson. They have been wonderfully augmented by bag packers Wendy Crawford and Tim Curtis with Liz and Roger Seaton who deliver fortnightly to a few who are unable to come and collect food, possibly through ill health. In addition one or two we have continued to support and deliver food to as they have managed to get part time work which makes it impossible for them to come on Friday mornings. Our thanks also to Graham Paddon, Graham Thomas and Manuel Spurgeon for faithfully collecting fresh food from Waitrose in Mill Hill on a weekly basis if supplies were available. And to Waitrose in Barnet, who over the years have supported the Food Bank. What now?

CCB Youth

God doesn't stop His work amongst young people here at CCB!

It is beautiful to see our young people growing not just in height but in faith too. Since last September a new group of kids transition to the group of young people on Sundays. This transition made the group younger and bigger. For that reason, we decided to divide this group in two creating a new structure for the program.

Now we have a group for youth years 6 and 7 called Way-makers and another one for years 8 and 9 which are the pathfinders, both at the 10.45 service which allow is to have deeper conversations with the older ones and have a more energetic session with the young ones. We provide youth work for around 15 kids on average on Sunday mornings.

Our group of older youth on Sunday evenings called ONE has been consolidating and now we have an average of 10 young people joining our sessions where we discuss, eat together, and build community.

At the Barnet college we had the opportunity to run an alpha at McDonalds which was an exciting opportunity to share the Christian perspective of the big matters of life to 12 young people totally disconnected to church, and because our weekly visits on Tuesdays we are starting a group with 3 believers on Wednesdays to support them and encourage them in their faith.

Our Friday Youth club called "the Livingroom" has been a safe space for an average of 15 young people who come to play games and we can share a bit about our faith with them.
